Attached is the formal request from Ms. Adrianne Dost to reenergize the German Exchange program with a school located in a region of Germany that offers rich cultural opportunities for our students. She also believes that the school itself is a great match for Glenbrook students. I am excited about the opportunity this trip will provide for our students to apply their language skills and to be immersed in German culture.

As we discussed, this is an Educational Tour covered under Board Policy 7230, which I will include with this proposal for the Board's information. This Educational Tour is conducted by the district, but not financed by the district and requires approval from the principal, superintendent and Board. The parameters put in place by Ms. Dost makes this trip similar to the Spanish Exchange trip and band trips that have occurred across District 225 throughout the years.

I support this request and believe these types of experiences greatly enhance our World Language program for the district's German students in the Academy and within Glenbrook South's German program.

Section A - Introduction

The Board of Education believes that structured learning should not be limited to the classroom. Valuable experiences for Glenbrook students exist within and outside the boundaries of District #225. The Board also realizes that additional responsibilities arise whenever students are taken from the school premises. Staff, parents, and students should be aware of these responsibilities and the necessity for reasonable administrative procedures. The physical welfare of our students and staff must always be paramount in our considerations. It shall be the policy of this Board of Education to maintain insurance for the liability of the district, its board members, its employees, and authorized volunteers as a result of student injury, property loss and general liability coverage on student trips. It shall also be the Board's policy to encourage the maintenance of adequate personal automobile liability and medical insurance by our staff members.

Section B - Definition of Student Trips

A student trip shall be considered to be a school-sponsored activity away from the school premises usually falling within two major areas.

1. Instructional Field Trips and Extended Classroom:

Instructional field trips provide experiences out of the classroom that are normally carried on during regular class hours and are related to the planned curriculum. In some instances pre- and post-school hours may be utilized.

- A field trip implements and/or augments group classroom instruction.
 Transportation for field trips is restricted by <u>The School Code</u> to Illinois or adjacent states.
- b. An "extended classroom" allows individual students to pursue their studies in various work-related, volunteer, or observation activities outside the classroom.

2. Student Activity Trips:

Student activity trips are connected with regularly sponsored in school or post-school programs and may include but not be limited to the following:

- a. An activity trip as part of an extracurricular activity
- b. A contest (or practice for a contest) between students representing Glenbrook and another secondary school, or between participants in intramural sports (contestants, cheerleaders, marching band, etc.)
- c A performance or exhibition displaying special talent by an individual or group of students (e.g., band, chorus, etc.)
- d. A convention or workshop in which an individual or group of students representing Glenbrook participate (e.g., student council convention or workshop)

Section C - General Parameters

- 1. All student trips must be approved by and will be subject to the procedures set forth by the school principal or the designated representative.
- Recommendation of the principal and approval of the superintendent shall be required for all overnight student trips. Recommendation of the principal and the superintendent and approval of the Board shall be required for all student trips conducted outside the State of Illinois or adjacent states.
- 3. Funding for student trips shall be in accordance with the guidelines adopted by the Board.
- 4. No student shall be penalized for non-participation in a class field trip. No student shall be penalized for participation in a class field trip or student activity trip.
- 5. Reasonable administrative care should be taken to ensure safety and orderly behavior on all student trips. Staff members shall accompany all field trips except "extended classroom" trips.
- 6. All Board and school policies, procedures and regulations regarding student conduct apply for students on student trips.

- 7. Transportation on all student trips should be by district-owned vehicles or by commercial vehicles, whenever practical. Occasionally, because of a limited number of participating students, private transportation is permissible when approved by the principal or the designated representative. In these instances, travel may be by private automobile, if the driver is a Glenbrook staff member, parent, or student.
- 8. Students participating in student trips must travel to and from the trip's destination in the school-sponsored mode of transportation unless an exception for good cause is made by the trip's sponsor for the student to be transported by the student, his/her parent or guardian.
- 9. The Parental Permission Slip and Field Trip Request Application, as specified in the procedures to this policy, shall be used in complying with this policy.

Subject: German Exchange Program

Exchange Proposal: This proposed student exchange will be the first between Glenbrook South/Glenbrook Academy of International Studies and Dietrich-Bonhoeffer Gymnasium of Baden-Württemberg, Germany. GBS has participated in a German student exchange program three times over the past six years. This proposal will continue this rich tradition with a new school. German students will visit Glenbrook South during the first week of the fourth quarter, April 5-9, 2010. The families of the GBS student exchange participants will provide housing and meals. Glenbrook students will visit Germany during June of 2010, after the school year. We are requesting board approval for this exchange.

The hosting portion for the exchange impacts Glenbrook South in the following ways:

- The German students will arrive during late March, 2010 and plan a five day youth hostel stay in downtown Chicago. They will then spend approximately 10 days with their host families in Glenview.
- The German visitors will be integrated into various predetermined classes, departments, guest lectures, as well as community organizations for the school week of April 5 through 9, 2010.
- GBS and Academy students, German teacher (Ms. Dost), and a freshman Academy teacher will accompany the German students and German exchange teachers on a joint field trip to New Glarus, Wisconsin, during one school day, with a stop at ecopreneur and GBS/Academy graduate Lisa Kivirist's Inn Serendipity, in Browntown, Wisconsin.
- The Dean's Office will provide student ID cards for all German visitors and bus passes if needed.
- The Dean's Office will allow for 20 extra students to eat lunch in the cafeteria during the German exchange week.
- Ms. Dost will arrange field trip transportation for the German students during their stay.

Germany, 2010

- The trip to Germany will start the week after finals in June. Our tentative departure date is Wednesday, June 16, 2010.
- The approximate cost will be \$1500 to go to Germany, based on airfare and reciprocal family and school hosting costs.
- Adrianne Dost (GBS and Academy German teacher) will work with District 225 to research and finalize all travel arrangements without the need for a travel agent. GBS students will be involved in travel research and planning.
- All school rules will apply to students during this exchange.

• A Student's Perspective: "As a student who has already visited Germany twice, I can say, with confidence, that an exchange with Germany would be an incredibly rewarding experience to practice what you are learning outside of the classroom. To meet and communicate with German kids my own age is something I have always wanted to do since I started my freshman year. Even students who have not been in German as long as I have will, without a doubt, benefit from being able to live with and communicate with native German speakers. As I have progressed through my years of German, the enthralling culture that the country cherishes has made me want to experience it first-hand more than anything. By approving this exchange, the whole school community, even the staff, will be able to see and learn from another culture that is not typically experienced by most Americans."

- History: German teacher Adrianne Dost has led two school groups on both a bus trip and a backpacking trip through Germany, years 2007 and 2008, respectively. Frau Dost lived in Heidelberg, Germany, as an undergraduate exchange student at Karl Ruprechts Universität for one school year. She also attended Berlin's Humboldt Universität on a year-long graduate fellowship. She has chosen to start a new partnership with a high-performing high school in an area of Germany with a strong economy that houses many global business headquarters, not unlike Glenview, an area with a sunny climate, many wonderful landscapes, and a grand appreciation for Germany's unique and fascinating culture and tradition.
- Board Approval: We are seeking board approval for a variety of reasons. This is an educational exchange conducted, but not financed by the district. The exchange would be part of the German American Partnership Program (GAPP), a non-profit high school exchange program between schools in Germany and the United States, sponsored by the German Foreign Office and by the US Department of State. In addition to its patronage, GAPP, Inc. contributes financial support under certain conditions. Moreover, this exchange has direct relevancy to the German curriculum at Glenbrook South and within the Glenbrook Academy of International Studies in that its main objective is the integration of students into the everyday life of exchange host families and into the classroom activities of host schools to provide them with a coherent intercultural experience to inspire intercultural understanding and to motivate personal friendships.
- In order to be eligible to participate in the exchange, students must be enrolled in second, third, fourth year, or AP German during 2010, and must be sophomores or juniors every other year thereafter.

Presentation to the Board: We are requesting your assistance in bringing this proposal before the School Board.
